ANTOINE'S STORY

Antoine arrived at Camp Agape in 2008, a reticent, wary nine year old with three years of loneliness and anger just under the surface. He hadn't seen his mother since she began serving her prison sentence in Vermont when he was just six years old. Antoine lived in New York City with his "godmother" Tina, whose minimum wage job was the sole support for a household of seven. She had done a good job caring for Antoine, but she had just about reached the limit of her ability to tolerate his explosive behavior. Meanwhile, in Vermont, Kids-A -Part facilitated weekly telephone calls between Antoine and his mother. With the kind of amazing collaboration that is possible in Vermont, Kids-A-Part started looking for someone able to enroll as a Fresh Air family for Antoine. He could come to Vermont on the Fresh Air bus. visit his mother, and attend Camp Agape. I volunteered. The Vermont Department of Corrections transferred Antoine's mother to the closest facility just for his visit.

Antoine was the last child off the bus. I was in awe at the

courage it must have taken for him to leave New York City and get into a car with a white stranger in rural Vermont. Every morning for a week, I walked him down the street to the women's prison to get re-acquainted with his mom. Every day, it was terribly hard

for him to go for the visit, and every day, it was terribly hard at the end to say good-bye. It was especially hard to stop the visits and go to this strange thing called Camp Agape.

Amazingly, he quickly bonded with two cabin-mates. They had nicknames and called themselves The Three Musketeers. They brought out the best in each other, and sometimes, the worst. Their volatile behavior was a constant challenge to maintaining safety and agape simultaneously. That first summer, I asked Antoine what he wanted to do with his life. His answer: "Nothin". "How will you support yourself?" "I'll step off the curb and get hit by a car. Then I'll sue."

Since 2008, Antoine has been reunited with his mother. He

has had periods of further abandonment, homelessness, and multiple school changes. At times, he has been enveloped in fog from attempts to use medication to treat a childhood of chaos and loss. In spite of all this, he is a good student, and now wants to be

a lawyer someday. He habitually bows his head before meals. He says thank you often. When anyone is hurting, he is empathetic. He has returned to Camp Agape and his "Fresh Air home" many times. One year, when leaving camp, he said: "Camp Agape is the only place in my life that my anger doesn't blast everyone."

I Matter...You Matter

Salley Gibney, founder of the You Are Never Alone Foundation, has been present at Camp Agape for many years, and is a big favorite with campers and staff alike. She shares her "caring coins" with the campers and encourages them to share coins with others in their lives. She tells them stories about the many places and people she has met through the coins. One camper, upon receiving her coin, said: "I'm never going to take this off."

This year, Salley shared the "I Matter...You Matter Movement" at camp. She led the children in a discussion

about the effects of bullying on themselves and their friends. They made a circle and tossed a ball to each other. As they received the ball, they would step into the circle and say: "I am special because..." Camp For 8-11 Year Olds

We will be holding two sessions of camp for 8-11 year olds. We staff cabins with two to three staff people for every five children. We supplement the cabin staff with camp directors, a chaplain, a consultant skilled in problem solving with children, relief counselors, an arts and crafts facilitator, and special activity people such as fisher-people, musicians, and storytellers. CliF (Children's Literacy Foundation) will come to visit, bringing storybooks to life, and guiding the children in choosing new books to take home. The children will build and paint memory boxes. They will scrapbook, dress up, make play-do and jewelry, drum and sing, fish, swim, canoe, sit around campfires, and sleep out under the stars. They will have moments in their day when they may turn their attention toward God. They will share all of this

with other children who have had similar life experiences and do so in a setting of *agape* - unconditional love and acceptance.

Older Kids 12 Years and Up

Children older than 11 years old, who attended Camp Agape previously, have two choices in 2012. They can attend a new Camp Agape session at Covenant Hills that is tailored just for them, or we will tuition them to one of the many camps offered by Covenant Hills open to everyone. The Camp Agape session for older kids is now almost filled. We have several attending other programs, and are excited to have two 15 year old long-time Camp Agape campers who have chosen to attend Leadership Camp. This may lead them to be Counselors-In -Training next year. It is especially heartening to see the formative influence that Camp Agape has had year after year on these older children.
